Crosstabulation Results

Methodology:

This poll was conducted from October 21-24, 2016, among a national sample of 1983 registered voters. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, region, annual household income, home ownership status and marital status. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.
