Morning Consult is setting a new standard for survey research.

On a daily basis, Morning Consult interviews over 5,000 registered voters across the United States. Along with 2020 presidential election data, Political Intelligence tracks the approval and electability for all governors, senators, House members, the President, and more at the national, state, and congressional district level.

Each week, this report will use that data to deliver key new insights on where voters stand.

- 1. Joe Biden Remains in Front Joe Biden receives 31% of the vote, followed by Bernie Sanders, who now receives 27%, and Kamala Harris who comes in third at 11%.
- 2. Holder Won't Leave Behind Much Potential Support Eric Holder announced he won't be running for president. In this latest poll he received just 1% of the vote share.
- **3. Sanders Fares Worse With High-Income Democrats** Among Democrats making \$100k or more, Sanders gets 19% of the vote. Among those making less than \$50k, he receives 30% of the vote.



This week's report features surveys with registered voters conducted from February 25, 2019 to March 3, 2019. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region.

Which Candidates Have Momentum in Early Primary States?

We have included an 'Early Primary States' demographic throughout this report to showcase who has momentum going into the primary elections. The numbers reflect voters who live in Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina, and Nevada.

About our Democratic Primary Results

Our Democratic Primary results are reported using 12,560 interviews with registered voters who indicate they may vote in the Democratic primary or caucus. For those who say don't know or no opinion, they are asked to pick a candidate they are learning towards, which are factored into the results. The margin of error for potential Democratic primary voters is +/- 1%.


About our Republican Primary Results

Our Republican Primary results are reported using 11,154 interviews with registered voters who indicate they may vote in a Republican primary or caucus. The margin of error for potential Republican primary voters is +/- 1%.




