*Methodology:*

This poll was conducted from March 06-14, 2019, among a national sample of 3073 MFA Supporters. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of MFA Supporters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2 percentage points.
