

Along with 2020 presidential election data, Political Intelligence tracks the approval and electability for all governors, senators, House members, the President, and more at the national, state, and congressional district level.

KEY TAKEAWAYS/ 09.09.2019

- 1. Warren grows her share of second place support. Warren is the second choice of 18 percent of Democratic primary voters up from 11 percent in February. The growth in second choice support has come while she has captured a larger share of first place support.
- 2. Biden leads with the voters most and least interested in politics. Thirty percent of voters who say they're extremely interested in politics support Biden as their first choice, as do 29 percent who say they aren't at all interested.
 - Warren performs notably better with voters who are extremely interested, while Sanders outperforms with voters who aren't at all interested.
- 3. Ahead of the debates, the national vote holds steady. Biden retains his lead in the national vote and in early primary states with Sanders and Warren trailing.



SECOND CHOICE SUPPORT BY CANDIDATE

After voters registered their first choice, they were asked a follow-up about who they would choose as a second option. The results below show where the supporters for a selection of leading candidates could go next.







1st choice:

Biden 33% current national vote share

Sanders 21% current national vote share

Warren 16% current national vote share

Harris 7% current national vote share

Buttigieg 5% current national vote share

2nd choice:

26% Sanders 24% Warren 12% Harris

29% Biden 27% Warren 7% Harris







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This week's report features surveys with registered voters conducted from September 2, 2019 to September 8, 2019. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region.

Our Democratic Primary results are reported using 17,824 interviews with registered voters who indicate they may vote in the Democratic primary or caucus. For those who say don't know or no opinion, they are asked to pick a candidate they are learning towards, which are factored into the results. The margin of error for potential Democratic primary voters is +/- 1%.

Which Candidates Have Momentum in Early Primary States?

We have included an 'Early Primary States' demographic throughout this report to showcase who has momentum going into the primary elections. The numbers reflect voters who live in Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina, and Nevada.



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
