Each week, this report will use that data to deliver key new insights on where voters stand.



- 1. Bloomberg would enter race with high name ID, little support. 87% of Democratic primary voters have heard of Michael Bloomberg, although just 2% said the former NYC mayor is their first-choice candidate.
- **2. Early state race tightens.** Joe Biden drops 4 points to 29% in the early state poll, as Elizabeth Warren increases 2%, Pete Buttigieg increases 4%, and Tom Steyer increases 1%.
- **3. Biden is strongest with voters who say Medicare/Social Security is their top issue.** The former VP leads with all voters except those who prioritize Education and Energy, who prefer Bernie Sanders over all other candidates.


#### DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY/ ALL DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY VOTERS

#### WHO'S LEADING THE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY/ EARLY PRIMARY STATES





#### Biden Leads With Voters Who Prioritize Top Issues

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This week's report features surveys with registered voters conducted from November 4, 2019, through November 10, 2019. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region.

Our Democratic primary results are reported using 16,400 interviews with registered voters who indicated they may vote in the Democratic primary or caucus. For those who say don't know or no opinion, they are asked to pick a candidate they are learning toward, which are factored into the results. The margin of error for potential Democratic primary voters is +/- 1%.

Which Candidates Have Momentum in Early Primary States?

We have included an 'Early Primary States' demographic throughout this report to showcase who has momentum going into the primary elections. The numbers reflect voters who live in Iowa, New Hampshire, South Carolina, and Nevada.



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
