Why Sanders Is Electable, Too

The latest hypothetical general-election matchup finds Sen. Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.) leading President Donald Trump by 4 percentage points, 46% to 42% – doubling his lead from last week's survey. He also performs better against Trump than former Vice President Joe Biden among a number of key voting blocs, including independents and 18- to 29-year-olds. ([Read more](#))

Booker's Second Choice Support Most Likely to Go to Biden

Twenty-four percent of Sen. Cory Booker's (D-N.J.) voters say former Biden is their second-choice candidate, followed by Sanders at 19% and Warren at 17%. Before dropping out of the race, Booker held 2% of the vote.

Billionaire Bump: Bloomberg Continues to Climb, Steyer Up in Early States

Former New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg claims 8% of the vote share nationally, with 4% for both Gen Z and millennial voters backing him. Bloomberg is among the top candidates for both Gen X and Boomers, claiming 8% of the vote share and 11%, respectively. Twenty days before the Iowa caucuses, Tom Steyer reaches 15% in early states. He claims 15% of the vote share, 4 points behind Sanders (19%) and 12 points behind Biden (27%).

Methodology: This week's report features 41,496 surveys with registered voters, including 17,096 surveys with Democratic primary voters, conducted from January 6, 2020 through January 12, 2020. The interviews were conducted online, and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of registered voters based on age, race/ethnicity, gender, educational attainment, and region.

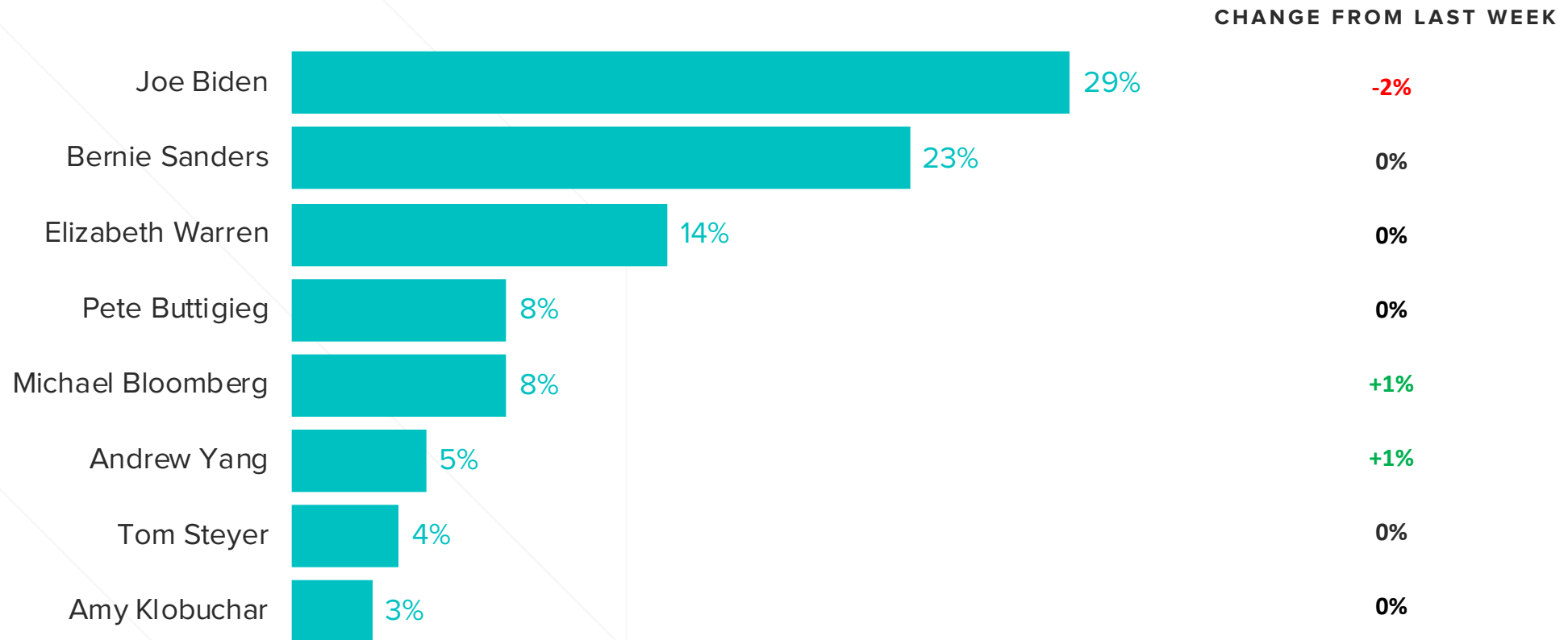
WHO'S LEADING AMONG DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY VOTERS

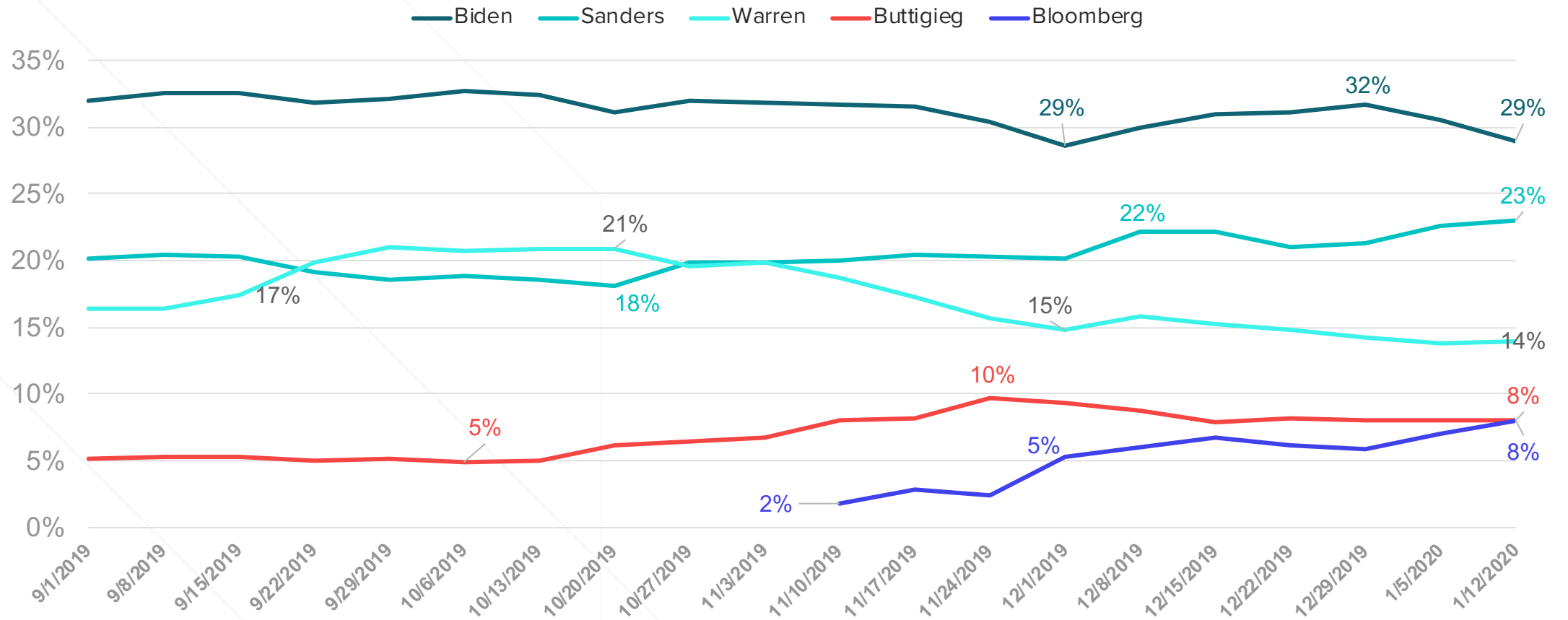

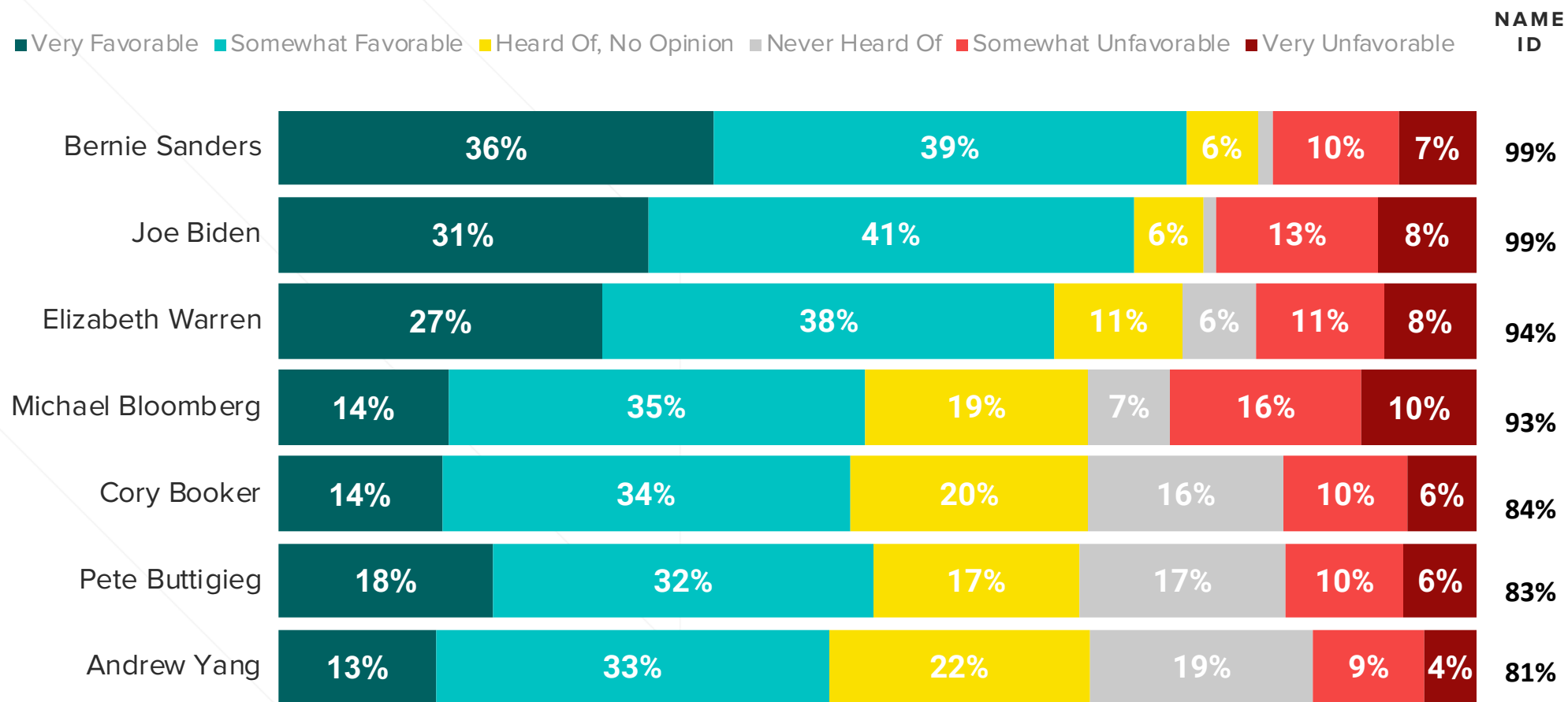

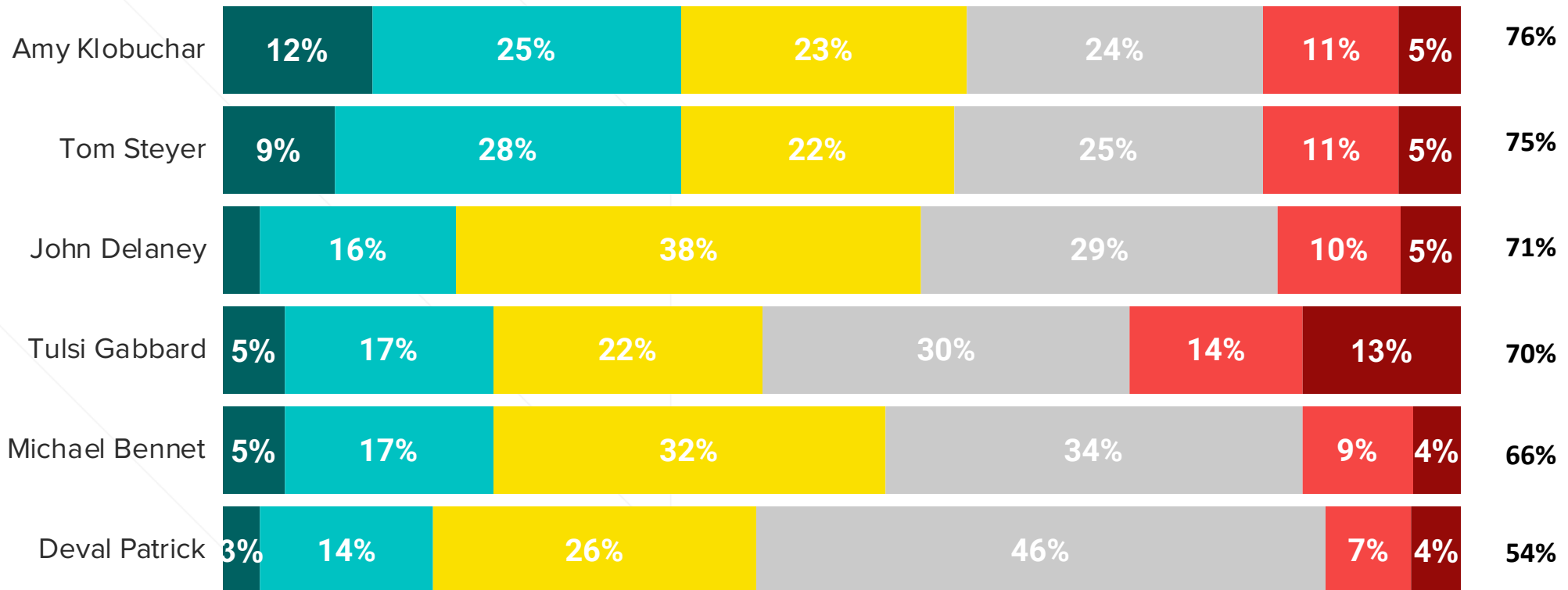

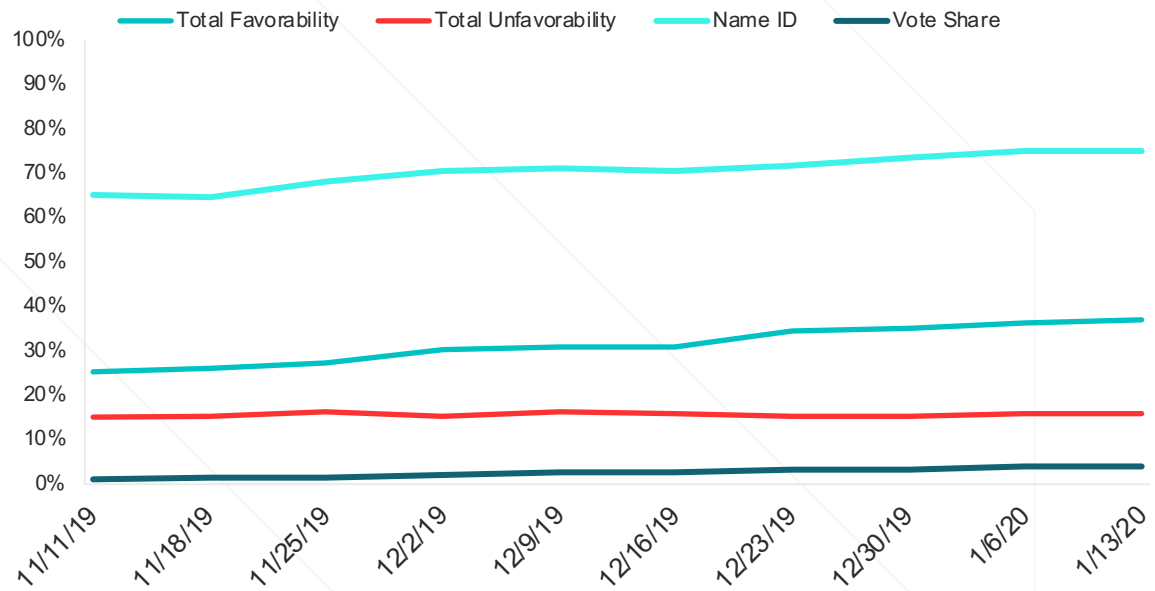

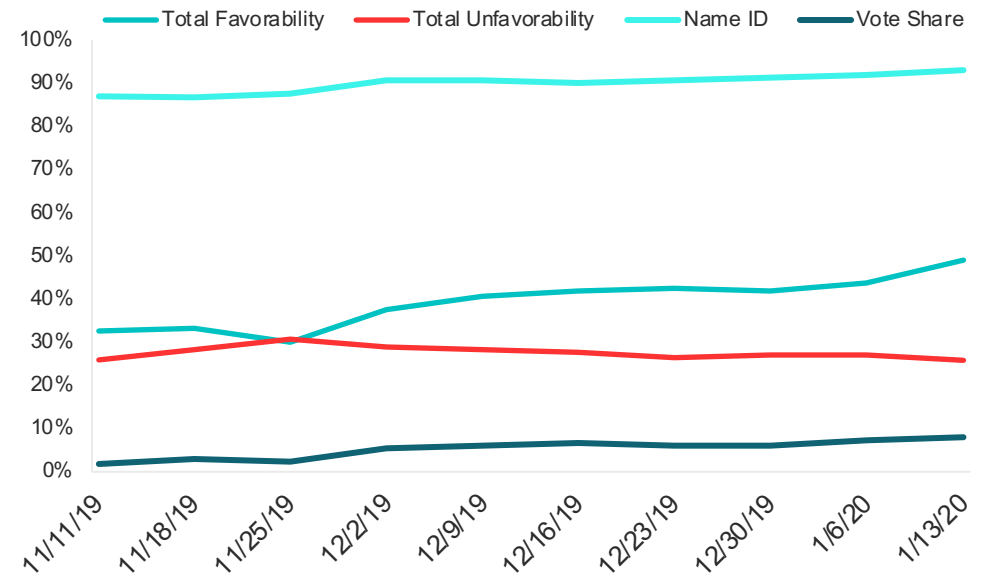

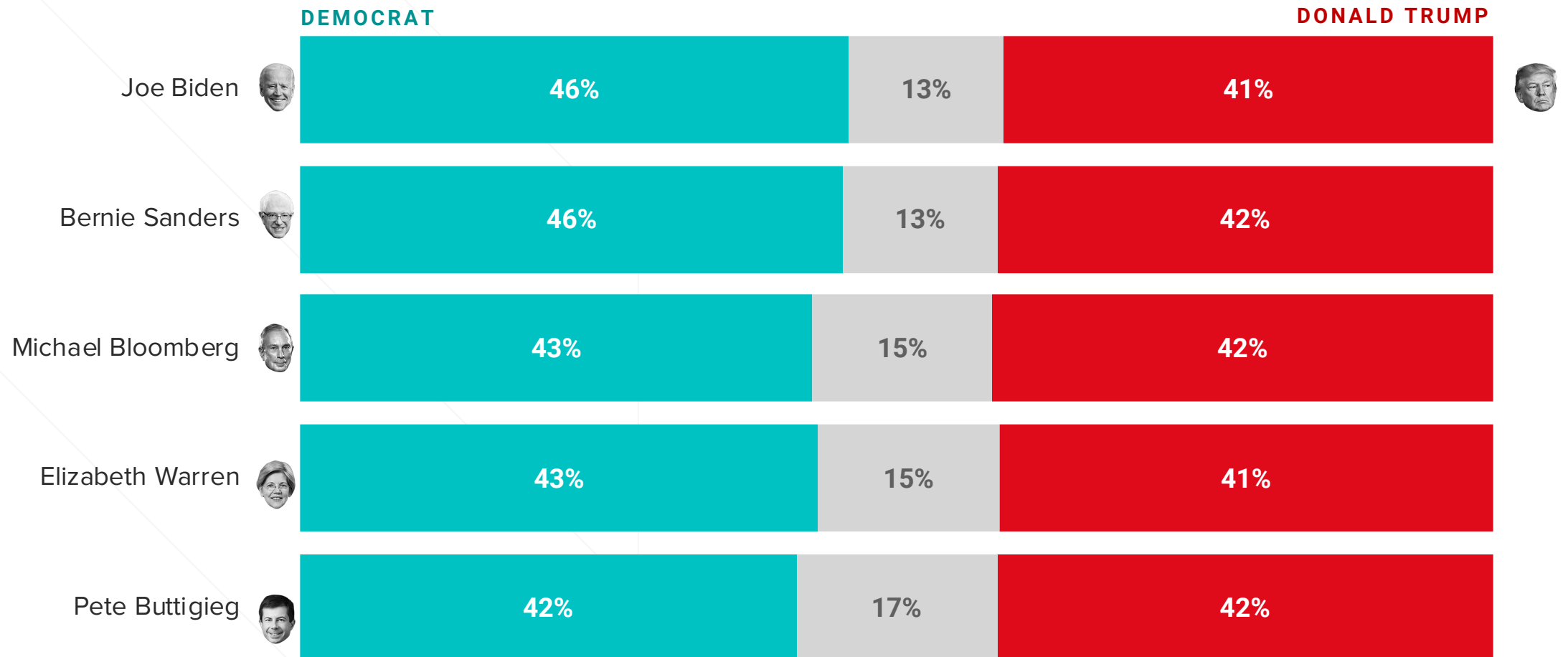
WHO'S LEADING AMONG REGISTERED VOTERS

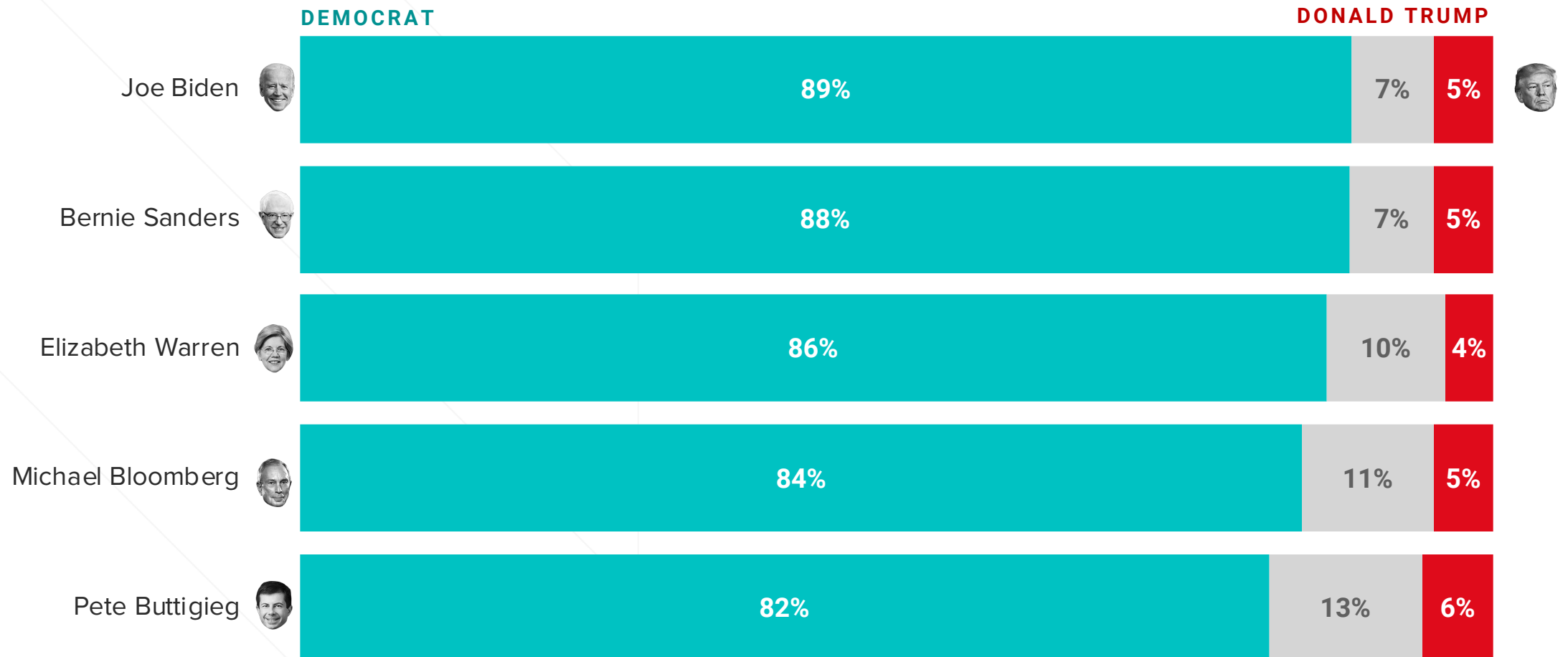
Among Registered Voters

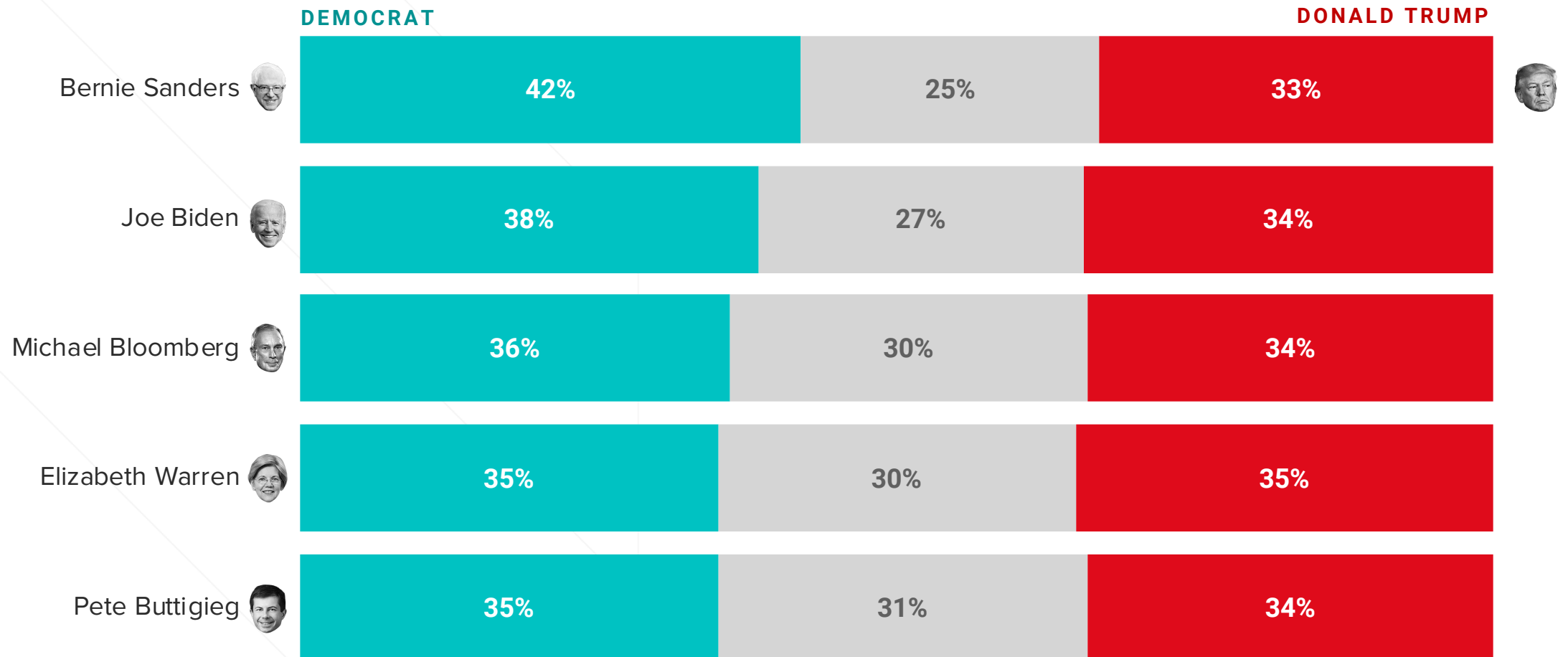
Among Democratic Voters

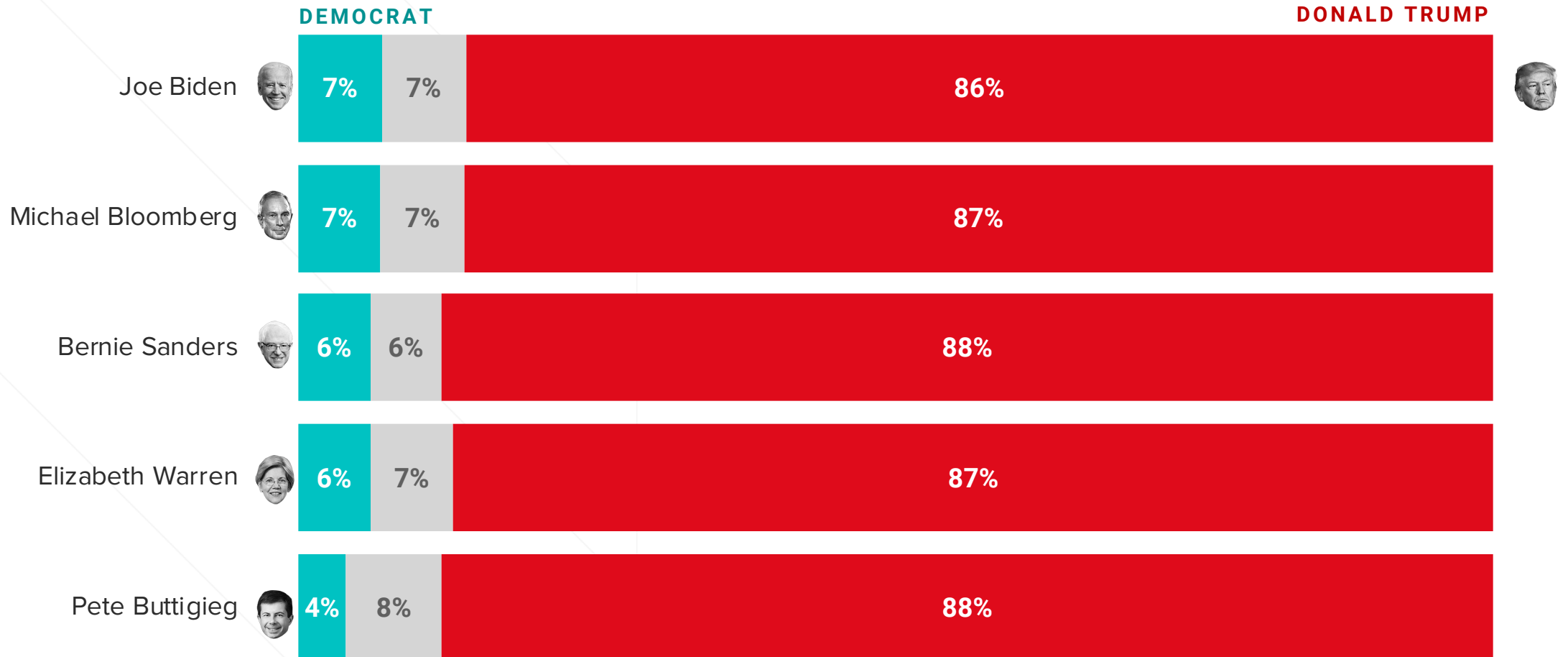
Among Independent Voters
